Ambassador talks government, religion and etiquette with students

Speaking in French, Ambassador Bariki was able to capture the attention of his ninth-grade student audience Wednesday morning at New London High School.

Students in World History classes prepared for his visit by reading an article the day before so they were able to ask detailed questions about what life is like for women in Africa, which religions are practiced, and how Ambassador Bariki works to connect the United States and his home country of Togo.

Ambassador Bariki stated that because there is such an extreme lack of technology in the entire country, Africa is falling behind. He said that children there would like to go to school but that there aren't any schools for them to attend. Students seemed to be interested in this aspect because many of them see going to school as a completely normal activity although children their age in other countries don't have that privilege. Ambassador Bariki also encouraged them to become future government leaders, saying that although Africa is rich in resources, its people live in extreme poverty. He asked students how they would help solve that problem if they were in government and some said they would work to bring fresh water and technology to the country. The District Mathematics Committee is comprised of teachers, instructional coaches, and the high school Mathematics Department Chair and represents all grade levels and all schools within the district. To date, the Committee has engaged in work with Dr. Nicki Newton, collaborating on the development of K-5 Common Core State Standards aligned yearlong curriculum and unit maps for mathematics. The committee's work with Dr. Nicki is designed to build capacity within the district with the responsibility for writing of curriculum unit maps being gradually released to New London faculty. Additionally, the committee has provided valuable feedback regarding the mathematics benchmark assessments, which were developed by Dr. Nicki and are being piloted K-5. This work will also be

extended beyond grade 5 as the year progresses. The DMC has identified key areas for focus for work to be done, including topics for professional learning, development of a mathematics assessment calendar for benchmarking and progress monitoring, and raising awareness about the importance of mathematical understanding and the culture of mathematics in our schools. Members of the committee have shared positive feedback regarding the opportunities presented for educators, students, and the district as a result of this committee's convening.

CHET Scholarship Winners and PEP Grant Winners

On Thursday, the Board recognized 15 New London High School seniors who are each recipients of \$2,500 in college scholarships from the Connecticut Higher Education Trust. New London High School had the highest number of students in Connecticut apply for the scholarship, which they were notified of earlier this month.



Board members also recognized the district's physical education and athletic staff who were awarded a district-wide Physical Education Program (PEP) grant in late September. The \$687,000 PEP grant will be used to launch Project Fit Kids – a new physical education program taking place in each of the district's schools. At the end of the project's first year, PEP will evaluate the district's performance and potentially award the remaining \$157,104 of the grant. Project Fit Kids will improve the district's Physical Education curriculum; increase teachers' knowledge of evidence-based practices for improving students' fitness and nutrition outcomes; increase the amount of time students are active; improve students' fitness levels and eating habits in addition to increasing the percentage of students with a healthy BMI.
